

Canadian employment still rising, but so is unemployment

- Employment bounced back 40k in August after edging down 6k in July. Most of the job growth was time (+32k) and hours worked rose 0.5%.
- Job growth has now averaged per month over the last three months and 41k year-to-date. Still, hasn't been enough to absorb rapidly increasing labour supply.

- The population increased by another record (103k) in August and the unemployment rate held steady at 5.5% after rising half a percent over the prior three months. The 0.5 percentage point increase over now 4 months to August is still the largest such increase outside of the pandemic since early in the 2008/09 downturn.
- Wage growth remains very firm but ticked lower on a year-over-year basis to 4.9% from 5.0% in July.
- There were other signs of labour market softness building: Statistics Canada reported the job changing rate (which typically declines when labour markets are softening) held at 0.4%, well-below the average 0.7% pre-pandemic. And broader measures of unemployment that include involuntary part-time work and worker discouragement (the "R8" unemployment rate) edged higher.
- <u>Bottom line:</u> The BoC remains highly data-dependent and won't hesitate to push interest rates higher if necessary to return inflation to the 2% target rate. And there are two additional labour market reports and two additional inflation reports before the next scheduled decision in October. But we
